


WHO can bid for IWUF events

Bidding Procedure:

- 1 Early Preparation Phase**

Submit Preliminary Registration Form and letter of intent
- 3 Application Phase**
Submit bid files: ■ Host City Application Form ■ Guarantee letters
- 4 Evaluation Phase**
Bid file verification & Site inspection by IWUF
- 5 Selection Phase**
Bid presentation Approval by IWUF Congress/Executive Board
Signing Host City Contract

Wushu in Brief

Wushu is the collective term for the martial arts practices that originated in China. Over its long history, wushu developed into numerous distinct styles and systems, each incorporating its own techniques, tactics, principles, and methods, as well as the use of a wide variety of traditional weapons. Wushu as a sport came into its own as two distinct disciplines, one defined by performance routines and the other a full-contact combat sport. Worldwide wushu practitioners, athletes, and fans number in the millions.

The World Wushu Championships (WWC) is the official world championship event hosted by the IWUF. Those attending the WWC are treated to the highest competitive level within the sport of wushu, both for men's and women's taolu and sanda. First held in 1991, the WWC takes place biennially and is unquestionably the official pinnacle championships of the IWUF. The World Wushu Championships also coincides with the IWUF's congress as well as various committee meetings.

The World Taijiquan Championships (WTJQC) is unique in that it focuses specifically on styles within the taijiquan (Tai Chi Chuan) discipline. Like other signature events hosted by the IWUF the WTJQC takes place biennially, and it is the competitive culmination of a discipline known around the world for its emphasis on patience, control, and balance.

Each World Wushu Championships yields a group of top taolu athletes that qualify to compete in the Taolu World Cup (TWC), the IWUF-hosted world cup event that focuses exclusively on taolu disciplines and has taken place every two years since 2016. Male and female winners are unquestionably the top taolu athletes in the world.
